

To Boldly Go

Dear Friends,

If you're a Star Trek fan like me, you likely recall the opening monologue that began each episode of that beloved series, including these lines:

Its continuing mission:

to explore strange new worlds, to seek out new life and new civilizations,

to boldly go where no one has gone before.

I have been thinking about those lines change more lives. I think it's safe to these last few weeks as I return to Northwest and begin my fourth year of ministry here. There is no fear that my journey will ever be ordinary and routine; ministry is proving to be an ongoing invitation to boldly go where I have never gone before.

One new, bold adventure involves how I am using technology here.

Technology? Yes! The Northwest staff and I are committed to fully engaging the technological tools that were introduced to us this past year by our capable Office Administrator Shirley Banks. That includes using Realm, the web-based membership management tool that allows us to easily locate member contact information and communicate with our ministry teams. It also includes using a cloudbased document storage system

called Box to eliminate duplicate efforts and provide a centralized place for our ministry records, as well as important congregational documents.

Our goal? To make the administrative aspects of managing our ministries more efficient so that we can touch and

say that a church, synagogue or other place of worship isn't the sort of organization that immediately springs to mind when thinking about technologically-advanced places. And, yet, I'm keenly aware of how many Northwest members connect with me on Facebook . . . and how many newcomers find out about us on the informative, attractive, easy to find and, now, mobile-friendly - Northwest website.

Just today, I received a phone call from a woman who says she was "desperately seeking" a place that she and her family could call their faith home.

"How did you find us?" I asked.

"I Googled you and saw your website. You are all the good things you say you are, aren't you?"



Yes, I sincerely hope so. To be welcoming and to let people know the joyful message of Unitarian Universalism means keeping our website current, appealing and easy to use. It means making it easy for staff and volunteers to connect with one another and gain access to the information they need to move their ministries forward. It means keeping excellent records that are easy to find to help facilitate effective leadership and smooth transitions over the vears.

Helping to transform the world into the place we dream about is a formidable task for any person of faith . . . any community of faith. My hope is that we'll use everything at our disposal – including what may seem like strange, new technology - to go boldly forward.

"Beginning is not only a kind of action. time out, stopped worrying about all the stuff that will come, and sat down to read for awhile. I hadn't read Edward Said's work since I was in graduate school, but he wrote an entire book on the subject of beginnings, so that's what I started reading.

> Said distinguishes between an origin and a beginning. Origin comes from the word oriri, meaning "to rise, become visible, or appear" whereas the word begin comes from beginnan, "to attempt or undertake, to start something." An origin is divine, mythical, and passive, Said says, while a beginning is secular, humanly produced, and active.

> A beginning, then, unites the practical need for a change with a theory -- an intention with a method -- and it unites change with what has come before it: "beginning is making or producing difference; but—and here is the great fascination in the subject difference which is the result of combining the already-familiar with the fertile novelty of human work."

All of which brings me back to the beginning of this new year at North-

west, but instead of thinking about the work ahead as a set of difficulties, I'm feeling a sense of excitement about the opportunities before us.

In our planning for this new year, those of us in staff and lay leadership positions at Northwest have thought about becoming an even more engaged and engaging congregation, developing continuity of leadership, articulating the congregation's vision, and building for the financial future of Northwest.

I hope that you will be delighted and intrigued by the changes that come with this new program year at Northwest. Even more so, I hope that we can all join together in an intentional process of holding on to what is good and valuable at Northwest while experimenting with new approaches.


unch with TED: The Danger of a Single Story September 16

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Mass Extinction: Life at the Brink, September 17



Are we careening towards the sixth mass extinction the Earth has experienced? Five mass extinctions have occurred already, wiping out the vast majority of our plant and animal life.

At 7:00 pm on September 17, Third Thursday Cinema will present Mass Extinction: Life at the Brink, a Sminthsonian documentary. This film features two of these cataclysmic events, one by a massive asteroid 66 million years ago, the other by volcanic eruptions 252 million years ago.

Experts believe that another mass extinction is looming that is not the

result of natural forces, but caused by the impact of human beings. With compelling evidence, paleontologist Anthony Barnosky suggests that this sixth event is already in motion as we witness changes in the atmosphere and species disappearing at an alarming rate.

A \$3.00 donation is suggested for the evening, sponsored by the UUCA Peace Network, which includes refreshments and a moderated discussion.






CUUPS Discussion Group

Donate the Plate: Making a Difference in the World

Dining For Women Supports Community-based Maternal Mental Health Care in Post-conflict Uganda, Sept. 20

This month we will learn about and support Community-based Maternal Mental Health Care in post conflict Uganda, a region where previous war trauma combines with ongoing poverty, stigma and gender-based violence to form a toxic environment for maternal mental health.

As many as one in four women will develop perinatal depression and are at risk for obstetric complications, pre-term labor and suicide. Their babies are at risk for pre-term birth, low birth weight, malnutrition, higher rates of childhood disease and missed immunizations.

The maternal mental health program will result in fewer mothers suffering from perinatal anxiety and depression as a result of psycho-education and learning stress reduction techniques. These women will show improved well-being and functioning as mothers and individuals, ensuring that they will take better care of themselves, their new babies and their families and participate in work to support their families and communities.
