October 11 – A Good Life, A Good Death



UUA Common Read and First Sunday Sermon Series Coming in January 2016



The 2015-16 Common Read selection is *Just Mercy*, by Bryan Stevenson, a *New York Times* bestseller and the winner of the Carnegie Medal for

Nonfiction. Stevenson was a young lawyer when he founded the Equal Justice Initiative, a legal practice dedicated to defending those most desperate and in need: the poor, the wrongly condemned, and women and children trapped in the farthest reaches of our criminal justice system.

Just Mercy is at once an unforgettable account of an idealistic, gifted young lawyer's coming of age, a moving window into the lives of those he has

Spicing Up Worship

Dear Friends,

Many of us are likely familiar with the expression “Variety is the spice of life.” That familiar line puts a positive spin on experiencing change, which can be both exciting and frightening.

Changes in our lives may call on our spirits to provide us with different things. Going through marital difficulties, the death of a loved one, serious health challenges, or financial problems require patience, strength, courage and wisdom – perhaps in ways we haven’t needed them before.

Or, for those of us raising children, we may be finding it a struggle to make Sunday mornings a family spiritual experience. Our kids may find Sunday services boring and we may wonder if it’s possible to introduce them to a worship experience that is meaningful for the entire family.

To address these changing and particular needs of the Northwest congregation, as well as to simply add a little spice to our worship offerings, two new worship experiences are being launched in 2015-16.



The first, “In the Spirit,” is a contemplative worship service that is being

held in the evenings on the third Tuesdays of every month through May 2016. The first “In the Spirit” service was held in the Northwest Sanctuary on September 15. It featured candlelight, simple, mystical hymns, short and thoughtful readings, and long periods of silence. It was pure heaven for me and – I gathered – for the seven or so people that joined Music Director Tom Godfrey and me that evening.

While Unitarian Universalist in content and character, “In the Spirit” is modeled loosely after Christian [Taizé](#) worship services which are held by an ecumenical monastic community in Taizé, France. The community has become an important site of Christian pilgrimage, with more than 100,000 young people from around the world traveling there each year for prayer, Bible study, sharing and communal work.

My hope is that “In the Spirit” will appeal not only to Northwest members and friends who long for a simple, quieter worship experience, but also to members of the wider inter-faith community seeking the same.

The second new worship service at Northwest is “Worship Café,” which will be held on the first Sunday of most months during the regular 10:00 AM worship hour starting in October.

Worship Café is intended to provide a less formal worship experience that will focus on fellowship and appeal to all ages. This “interactive” service will serve breakfast foods and beverages prior to the service, which can be brought into the Sanctuary during



worship. It will offer an opportunity for children to “artfully” express their thoughts and feelings about their worship experience during the service with crayons and butcher paper. And, there’ll be a time during the service for sharing thoughts about that day’s “message,” as well as lots of opportunities for singing and learning new songs with The Northwest Band.

Why are we doing all of this? In addition to the regular Sunday 10:00 AM service, Northwest members and friends already have had wonderful opportunities to experience earth-centered worship services thanks to the efforts of the congregation’s CUUPS group (Covenant of Unitarian Universalist Pagans). These new offerings are just two more ways of acknowledging that, when invited, the holy can and does show up in many different ways.

Spice for the spirit is a beautiful thing. I hope you’ll try sprinkling a few new worship services into your regular diet in the days ahead . . . and see what happens.

Three Bags

One of the best things about being a freelance musician is the variety of work. A short list of weekly activities includes practicing, teaching lessons, rehearsing, playing gigs, and of course all the things that go into being Northwest's music director, including rehearsals with the choir or band, planning those rehearsals, writing arrangements, meeting with the staff, supervising the sound system, and much more. I am rarely bored!

With all this going on, it's easy to lose track of deadlines or priorities. When we began the new program year in August, I found myself off track and out of focus. What to do?

I bought three bags.

I bought three bags for logistical reasons. I have three main areas of work: teaching, performing, and church music. With just one bag, I had to constantly empty it and refill it, depending on what I was doing that day. If I played a gig on Saturday night, I

would have to repack it on Sunday morning. Then I would have to repack it again for teaching on Monday. I spent more time than I would have liked emptying out that bag and refilling it again.



By using a separate bag for each major area of work, I predictably found myself spending less time packing and unpacking. What I didn't expect was that I began to be able to separate my areas of work more easily. The contents of my bags don't mix anymore. Similarly, my teaching, performing, and "churching" don't bleed into each other as much as they used to.

It's not that I stop thinking about Northwest when I am doing other things, but I can put it aside. For example, maybe I'll get an idea for the

Northwest Band while I'm practicing guitar. Instead of pursuing that idea right then and there and taking away from my valuable practice time, I'll jot down my idea and resume practicing. Later on, when I've blocked out some time for Northwest work, I'll follow up on my idea.

Performing, teaching, and Northwest – each area of my work life is getting more and more complicated. But the bags help.



Melissa Fleming of the UN's refugee agency tells the refugees' stories — and asks us to help them rebuild their world.




Book Groupies Meet on Oct. 13

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

The Rise of Isis, October 15

How did ISIS become a major force so quickly? And what does it mean for the U.S. and coalition forces to be back in Iraq, fighting a new war on terror?

Third Thursday Cinema presents *The Rise of Isis* on Oct. 15 at 7:00 pm at the UUCA. *The Rise of Isis* is a major, in-depth PBS investigation of the brutal terrorist group's ascent, from veteran journalist Martin Smith. It investigates the miscalculations and mistakes behind the rise of the ruthless jihadist group. This documentary lays out, in chilling detail, the buildup of unheeded warnings, failures, and missed opportunities that allowed al-Qaeda in Iraq to become ISIS," says Smith, who was on the ground in Iraq when the U.S. began airstrikes [in the summer of 2014].



In *The Rise of ISIS*, Smith draws on comprehensive interviews with Iraqi politicians, American policymakers and military leaders (including Chairman of the Joint Chiefs of Staff Gen. Martin Dempsey, Deputy National Security Advisor Ben Rhodes and former Secretary of Defense Leon Panetta) to explore and explain how ISIS developed into what one interviewee calls "the al-Qaeda that Osama bin Laden only dreamed of building."

“Donate the Plate” Becomes “Share the Plate” Starting in November


The Board of Trustees approved a new approach for contributing to social justice organizations emerging among UU congregations nationally. On one Sunday each month, we have been donating 100% of plate cash and undesignated contributions to a justice cause. Our new approach will be to “Share the Plate” (STP) every Sunday with 50% of the undesignated monies going to a justice cause and 50% to Northwest’s operating budget.

You might ask: Why change it at all?

We recognize that not every member attends the “Donate the Plate” (DTP) Sunday and may miss the opportunity to contribute. Even if present, they may not have come prepared with cash or a personal check. STP increases the window of opportunity to contribute. We also have a chance to learn more about the specific cause.

But won’t this decrease cash and pledge donations to Northwest? At a

stewardship leadership conference last spring, Brian Freeman learned that congregations that “Share the Plate” throughout the month experienced substantial increases in contributions compared to congregations that held a once-a-month “Donate the Plate” approach as done by Northwest.



“Share the Plate” congregations uniformly experienced an increase in contributions for both the congregation and the recipient organization. The reason may be increased opportunities for members to contribute to the recipient, each week, rather than once a month. Perhaps by providing a

worthy sponsored organization, members found it easy to increase their charitable donations, in addition to their pledge.

How do I designate where my plate contribution goes? The mechanics of STP are slightly different than today’s DTP. If you wish to contribute, you may add cash to the plate on any Sunday or you may write a check with no note in the memo line. These contributions will be split between Northwest and the recipient evenly. If you wish 100% of your contribution to go to the recipient, note the name of the recipient or “STP” in the memo. As always, checks with “pledge” in the memo will go toward your pledge.

Northwest will begin “Share the Plate” next month. Social Justice MTL Marcia Kreycik asks everyone to consider making a generous contribution to STP on one of the Sundays in November.


George Gershwin, Johnny Mercer, and Jerome Kern take on a jazzy style with Frank playing acoustic guitar and Bill playing clarinet.


What Matters in the End
