Dismantling Racism Requires Overcoming Capitalism

UUs are in the process of formally committing ourselves to "dismantle racism in ourselves and in our institutions." Tracing racism's history on our continent, and how we have historically enshrined it in our governing documents and practices, can give us some clues about its origins and causes. This service will address the most direct way that liberatory communities can pull racism out by its root cause.

About our speaker today:

Rev. Jonathan Rogers is the Faith Coordinator for Freedom University, a freedom school for undocumented students based in Atlanta. He previously served NWUUC as Interim Minister in 2018-2019; his first appearance in the NWUUC pulpit was over a decade ago, leading the offering during the installation of Rev. Terry Davis. Rev. Jonathan really likes helping people, and believes that, as Nelson Mandela wrote, "The purpose of freedom is to create it for others." These days, you can find Rev. Jonathan at Stop Cop City protests, in-patient hospice wards, and at Abundant Luuv UU in Atlanta's West End.

Art Speaks: Dr. Billy Taylor by Philip J. Rogers

In 1960 composer, Billy Taylor wrote "I Wish I Knew How It Would Feel to Be Free," a jazz piece originally recorded as an instrumental and later released as a song with lyrics by Dick Dallas with the original version, "I Wish I Knew," recorded in 1963.

The evocative lyrics by Dallas express the inner thoughts of the black community in America. The song refers to the fact that in the Pledge of Allegiance, "...with liberty and justice for all" was/is not actualized in the daily lives of persons of color. The first and third verses state,


I wish I knew how it would feel to be free;
I wish I could break all these chains holding me.
I wish I could say all the things I could say;
Say it loud, say it clear for the whole world to hear.

I wish I could give all I'm longing to give;
I wish I could live like I'm longing to live.
I wish I could do all the things I could do;
Though I'm way overdue, I'd be starting anew.

The 2016 composition "Freedom" performed by Beyoncé refers to this narrative and ends with the words, "Hey! I'ma keep running 'cause a winner don't quit on themselves" as well as, "I had my ups and downs, but I always find the inner strength to pull myself up. I was served lemons, but I made lemonade." Forced to make lemonade!

In conclusion, it is imperative in 2024 to look beyond that which we often choose to ignore and be about actually contributing to make "...with liberty and justice for all" an actual truth... for all.

Board Announcements

From the President

The Committee on Ministry (COM) has successfully completed the ministerial search that they commenced some 3.5 months ago. I am pleased to announce that the **Reverend Jennifer (Jenn) Dalton**, M. Divinity, has agreed to serve as NWUUC's part-time contract minister for the next year, beginning September 1.

Jenn has three grown children – Amelia, Paige & Malachi – and resides in Kennesaw. She and her children are well known to some of us at NWUUC. Jenn first came to NW some twenty years ago after one of her children requested that she attend Sunday school. Jenn was an active member at Northwest for several years serving as a Worship Associate, a board member, a middle school RE teacher and a Coming-of-Age class instructor for high school youth.

Jenn received her call to ministry while at Northwest and applied to the Candler School of Divinity at Emory where she received a full scholarship. Jenn focused on chaplaincy and pastoral care for some time and later completed a parish ministry internship where she led services, created an adult RE class, assisted with an OWL program, and actively participated in the social justice ministry. Jenn served as a deacon offering pastoral care for two years. Jenn currently works at a non-profit where she has helped people find employment for the last three years. She has also served as a guest minister at the Mountain Light Unitarian Universalist Church in Elijay for the past twelve years. In addition to all these accomplishments, the COM received glowing recommendations from all her references.

Jenn will continue to hold her current position at the non-profit and will serve as a half-time minister at Northwest working an average of 20 hours each week. She will be leading 18 services and participating in church activities over the next year. Other duties will include pastoral care, staff supervision, holding office hours, attending meetings, leading special events and overseeing Congregation programs and operations administration in collaboration with the Board of Trustees. Remaining services will be led by a rotation of guest ministers along with lay led services by Worship Associates.

I would like to express my thanks and congratulations and that of the Board of Trustees to the members of the Committee on Ministry -- Kristen Fowks, Veta Tucker, Lil Woolf and David Zenner – for a job well done. When you have the opportunity, please thank them for their dedication, long hours of work, and for successfully completing a critical ministerial search in a very short amount of time.

From the Finance Trustee


2023-2024 Books Are Closed

This Month, your Justice Team has selected <u>Kate's Club</u> as our Donate the Plate Recipient.



Kate's Club mission is to empower children and teens, their families, and young adults facing life after the death of a parent, sibling, caregiver, or someone important to them. They're working to create a world in which it's okay to grieve.

In 2003, Kate's Club launched in Atlanta, GA with a gathering of six children for a social outing at a bowling alley and has matured into a dynamic, statewide nonprofit that has helped more than 10,000 grieving children and teens, their families, and young adults understand how to cope with their grief and know they are not alone.

Kate's Club is a place where being separated from someone important to you can be connective. Where experiencing a death can mean entering a new chapter of life. And where missing someone can lead to feeling seen. In this club, grief is challenging but it's also growth — an example of how every part of life can become a chance to have a positive experience if you're supported and among a community.


Their programs are guided by the National Alliance for Children's Grief's Standards of Practice. Kate's Club grief support programs for kids, teens, and their families focus on social connections, improving healthy coping strategies, and building confidence and self-esteem. Kate's Club provides grief s upport programs for young adults (18–30) so

that they can connect with others who are also facing life after the death of someone important to them. Their programs for parents and caregivers provide support, education, and resources to adult family members supporting children or teens while grieving the death of someone important.

In 20 years, Kate's Club has empowered tens of thousands of grievers throughout Georgia through direct service, education and advocacy.
